

The Recovery Act Investment in Comparative Effectiveness Research: Interim Assessment & Implications

Dominick Esposito, Ph.D., is a senior researcher and deputy director of the Center on Health Care Effectiveness. He was deputy project director of a formative evaluation of the more than 400 clinical effectiveness research (CER) projects funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, conducting a midstream assessment of the \$1.1 billion CER investment. His research experience includes mixed-methods evaluations of Medicaid and Medicare programs for beneficiaries with complex chronic illnesses. He holds a Ph.D. in economics from the University of California at Santa Barbara.



Sheldon Greenfield, M.D., is executive co-director of the Health Policy Research Institute and Donald Bren Professor of Medicine at the University of California at Irvine. His research has focused on primary care outcomes, quality of chronic disease care, patient participation in care, and assessment of comorbidity. His current research focuses on performance assessment at the individual physician level, heterogeneity of treatment effects, CER, and the quality of chronic disease care for ethnic and racial minorities. Dr. Greenfield is a former president of the Society for General Internal Medicine. He holds a medical degree from the University of Cincinnati College of Medicine.



Bryan Luce, Ph.D., is the chief science officer at the Patient-Centered Outcomes Research Institute (PCORI). He is responsible for leading the development and implementation of PCORI's patient-centered CER agenda. Dr. Luce's research has focused on improving methods and related policies for more efficient health care decision making. He holds an M.S. in public health and an M.B.A. from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst and a Ph.D. in health services research from the University of California at Los Angeles.



Eugene Rich, M.D., director of the Center on Health Care Effectiveness, is a senior fellow in Mathematica's Washington, DC, office. He is an expert on the sources of practice variation in medical care with a particular focus on the influence of the policy, payment, and practice environment on health professionals' decision making. He also has longstanding interests both in the role of evidence in point-of-care decision making and in comparative effectiveness research and primary care policy. Dr. Rich holds a M.D. from Washington University in St. Louis



Sanford Schwartz, M.D., is the Leon Hess Professor in Internal Medicine at the school of medicine and professor of economics at The Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania. He is a clinically oriented health services researcher who studies the adoption and diffusion of medical innovations and is focused on medical decision making. Dr. Schwartz received his medical degree from the University of Pennsylvania.
